



In South Africa:

- 90 % of the population has access to a cell phone
- 57% of mobile web users never or infrequently use a computer to access the internet.
- In 2011, Vodacom estimated that 92% of its users have a web enabled 'phone





Language & Ontology

Artefact (E 1915.30) Anth TAG: Club (MAA: 1992-12-01)

NUM: 1

KEYWORD: Weapons; Ceremonial Objects

MATERIAL: Metal; Copper

DESCRIPTION: A very heavy hand club of hammered copper, both faces of the blade are decorated with an incised pattern and the club terminates in a bird-like head design with an open beak. A short leather thong extends from a hole at the base of the bird-like head. The club is brownish in colour and shows sign of wear around the neck, it also has a beaten surface.; Good 'adhered old label notes " Haida club ([?] maker [word unclear] copper) Nootka Sound [?] unclear word] Gerf r Bevan" R.Hand

CONTEXT: The catalogue card calls the hand club a Haida hand club, but gives the provenance as Nootka Sound. The whalebone equivalents of this club were typical of the Nootka, and therefore it seems more likely that the Nootka provenance is correct, especially with the additional "Vancouver Island" on the catalogue card (G.Crowther). The original European tribal names and, where possible, current tribal names have both been given in separate GLT fields. The club was mis-numbered as 1915.25, the description of 1915.30 coincides with the club, while the description for 1915.25 is for a

Conclusions

- Digitisation is NOT simple!
- Challenges: physical access to ICT; ownership of digital items; loss of control over interpretations; language and ontology of communication; sensitive knowledge.
- Increased access: greater potential for engagement; facilitates new interpretations; produces new knowledge.
- Need to take into account digital difference and seek local solutions, such as mini webpages
- Carefully conducted digitisation projects might further democratise South Africa's archives.
